Re-Entering Foster Care for Youth Aged 18-21

Are you between the ages of 18 and 21 and struggling with housing or homelessness?

You may be able to re-enter foster care and get the support you need.

I left care at 16 or older and would like to return to care before turning 21. What do I need to know?

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Section 1

What does re-entry into foster care mean?

If you were a youth in foster care who left care at the age of 16 or after and you are under the age of 21, you may be able to re-enter foster care.

How do I know if I can re-enter foster care?

You may re-enter care if you answer yes to **all** of the following questions:

- Are you between the ages of 18 and 21? **AND**
- Were you in foster care on or after your 16th birthday? **AND**
- Are you currently struggling with housing or homelessness? **AND**
- Are you seeking a safe and stable place to live?





What are the steps I need to take to re-enter foster care and who can help me?

There are a few different places you can start to begin the process of re-entering foster care.

Begin by:

- Talking to your former caseworker
- Calling the Local Department of Social Services (LDSS) where you used to be in foster care (You can find the contact information for the LDSS here <https://ocfs.ny.gov/directories/localdss.php>)
- Calling the **OCFS Human Services Call Center** at 844-454-6569

Don't hesitate to use your voice to advocate for yourself by telling them you are aware of the [OCFS policy 22-OCFS-ADM-04](#) that allows you to re-enter foster care if you are eligible.





What resources may be available to me if I decide to re-enter foster care?

If I re-enter foster care, where will I live? Do I have to go back to my foster home?

You may get additional supports that could help you to:

- Find and maintain safe, stable housing
- Finish school (high school, vocational programs, and college)
- Access health care—including sexual and reproductive health care
- Access mental health services
- Get assistance receiving copies of important documents, such as an ID and birth certificate
- Get support in finding and keeping a job
- Develop independent living skills, such as how to manage money, file taxes, cook, etc.

There are a few different options if you choose to re-enter care.

You might be able to live:

- With a foster family, perhaps with a family you've lived with before or a kinship setting with a family member
- In an apartment, perhaps with a roommate
- In a dorm room at college if you are already there or if you anticipate attending college (you don't have to return to a foster home)
- In a group setting with others (such as independent living programs)
- Somewhere else, with the help of a caseworker

Ask your caseworker questions about your options. The most important thing is that you use your voice to communicate where you would like to live.

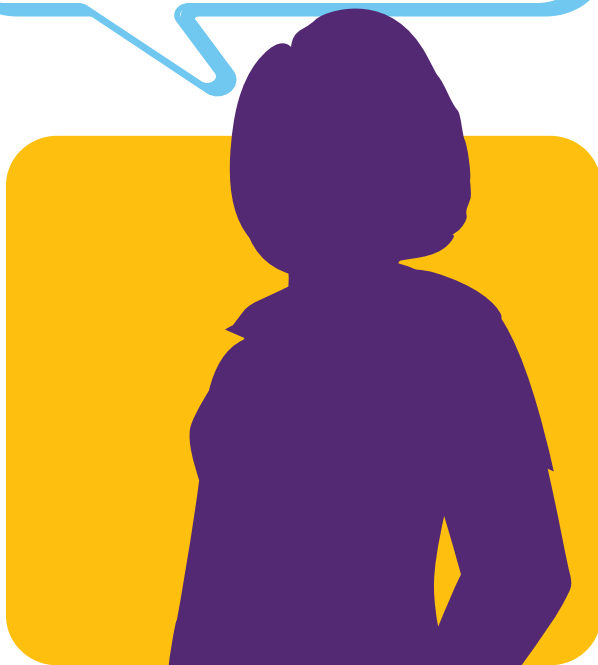
